America and Its Guns

Dear High Street Friends:

Don't tell Cathy; but sometimes when I am home for lunch I catch an episode of "The Lone Ranger." The episodes being aired right now are from 1950. They are older than I am. Cathy would tell you that the acting is bad, and the scenery is worse. I can't really argue with her. But then again, I grew up watching "The Lone Ranger." He was one of my childhood heroes. And I imagine for many of us, when we hear the "William Tell Overture," we don't think first of William Tell but of the Lone Ranger.

I have noticed that most of the episodes do not end up in a gun battle. Most of the time when the Lone Ranger shoots his gun, he is shooting a gun out of one of the bad guy's hand. This is a precision of shooting that probably is not realistic at all. The episodes are almost always resolved, however, through fisticuffs.

The other thing I am noticing is the number of times poor Tonto gets hit over the head and knocked out. This seems like a staple of each show. Now that we are so very aware of the damage done by repeated concussions, I am wondering how Tonto could even appear in the next season of the show without displaying some severe symptoms.

But let me return to the guns and the fist fights. We live in a society now where not only in the media but on our streets more issues are "resolved" through the use of guns. We are by far the most gun-violent nation on the planet. I am particularly observant of how the Lone Ranger uses his guns because Pastor Sherrie

and I will be leading a discussion group on "America and Its Guns" as part of Update Learning. There are a number of worthwhile classes being offered through Update Learning this fall, as the enclosure indicates. As you consider your schedule and the classes offered through Update, I invite you to join us pastors in this six-week discussion.

I am also observing how the Lone Ranger operates as a hero. He seems to show up at the needed time in the needed place. He sides with the underdog against evil. He seeks no credit. And he consistently in the various episodes espouses certain values.

This September and October Pastor Sherrie and I will be preaching a series on "The Heroic Life." We won't be focusing upon riding a white horse or shooting silver bullets. We are going to focus upon values. These values we will find in the choices Moses makes in his life, and there is no greater Old Testament hero than Moses. And it is his story that may well have impacted our understanding of who we are as a nation more than any other Biblical character or possibly anybody else in history.

You will find enclosed a handout on this upcoming series. I invite you to come be a part of this exploration of "The Heroic Life," and I encourage you to pass the handout along to someone else whom you are inviting to church.

Shades of Queen Victoria!

Pages from the Past

“To make and inspire the home is woman's high prerogative.”

This quote begins a cookbook published by the women of High Street Methodist Episcopal Church in the early 1920s.

The Foreword says:

“More and more we are convinced that digestion is one of the great secrets of life and happiness, and the character, virtue, and all moral qualities are powerfully affected by soups, meats, and palatable desserts. The home is the balance wheel of society and the state, and so home making is after all the highest of all professions, the real masterpiece of every woman.”

But simply preparing good food was not enough! The Foreword goes on to leave no doubt that the way food is *served* is of great importance. An entire page is devoted to the topics of the Setting of the Table, the Order of Service, Directions for Service, and Styles of Service.

Under “setting of the table,” the reader is told:

“The silver, china, linen, and glass put in place for one person at the beginning of a meal are called a ‘cover.’”

“Silver, linen, and dishes should be placed one inch from the edge of the table toward the plate in the order in which it will be used.”

“Place knife at right of plate with cutting edge toward plate.”

“Forks at left of plate, tines up.:

“Water glass to be placed at tip of knife, bread and butter plate at tip of fork.”

“Napkin should be placed at the left of fork.”

Queen Victorian died in 1901, but her influence lived on. During her reign, gender roles were stringently defined. Men were to be wage earners, voters, and legal

owners of the family property. Women were expected to stay at home, raise the children, learn and apply all the domestic skills, and support the husband in promoting his career. Many echoes of such Victorian customs may be found in this wonderful Cook Book.

Moreover, this is an admirable example of what were known as “advice manuals,” books that counseled people (especially the young ones) on life issues, manners, hygiene, and moral purity, even down to what was considered safe to read. Many, such as this one, gave advice on food and meal preparations.

However, just at this time, major changes were on the way. World War I had stirred things up. The 19th Amendment had given women the right to vote. In fact, a Muncie woman had been the first to be elected to the Indiana Legislature! Women were taking up causes such as temperance, child welfare, and social inequality. Education and employment levels among women were rising. The little Cook Book seems sweetly oblivious to all of this.

In our present age of fast food, fragmented family life, and shifting moral values, we may be pardoned for looking back to an era which—despite glaring imperfections—had its charms and a certain claim on our nostalgia.
